#### **Digital Citizenship**

Appropriate, responsible technology use including how we treat others and their work on our electronic devices\*

## What is internet safety?


**Internet Safety** 

How to be safe and protect yourself and your privacy when online.

Our student connection: we learn how to safely cross the street, ride our bikes, or answer the door when our parents are not home.

## What did our Fifth Grader survey tell us?

Where do you spend the MOST time on the Internet at home?




Family room	19	26.4%
Your bedroom	26	36.1%
Living room	11	15.3%
Kitchen	4	5.6%
A home office	3	4.2%
I don't have Internet at home.	0	0%
Other	9	12.5%

36% of students surveyed spent the most time on the Internet in their bedrooms

## **1/5** of fifth graders reported...

I have contacted or been contacted by someone online who I do not know.





Yes 15 20.8% No 57 79.2%

20% of students surveyed report being contacted or have been contacted online by someone they do not know.



## Kindergarten

APS Central Question:

How do I go places safely on the computer?



- Making connections to literature (Little Red Riding Hood)
- Exploring virtual field trips (San Diego Zoo)
- Asking parent or teacher before they go online

### First Grade

**APS Central Question:** 

How do you stay safe when you visit websites?



- Making connections to websites they already use (PebbleGo, BookFlix)
- What to do if they accidently click on a link that takes them off a website
- Asking parent or teacher before they go online

## **Second Grade**

**APS Central Question:** 

What kinds of information should I keep to myself when I use the Internet? What is a digital footprint?



- Defining the word "private"
- Sharing information with their teacher or parents
- Relating "privacy" to their iPad usernames and passwords including their Apple IDs.
- Relating "digital footprint" to footprints on the beach what you leave behind online will not "wash away".

#### **Third Grade**

**APS Central Questions:** 

What is spam and what can you do about it?

What is cyberbullying and how do you deal with it?



- Defining the word "spam"
- Exploring ways to avoid unwanted messages
- Learning that sharing of personal information only may not be safe and may cause internet "junk mail"
- Knowing when to ask an adult for assistance
- Identifying when they are being cyberbullied
- Developing strategies to deal with cyberbullies
- Empathizing as part of being a good digital citizen

#### **Fourth Grade**

**APS Central Questions:** 

Which keywords will give you best search results?

How do I cite different types of online sources?



- Learning how keywords can help focus or narrow their search (used Library's online catalog)
- Understanding how citing sources is part of being a good digital citizen
- Utilizing Library-based sources in authentic situations and citing those resources

#### Fifth Grade

**APS Central Questions:** 

What does it mean to be a good digital citizen?
What kinds of responsibilities does a digital citizen have?



- Comparing offline citizenship with digital citizenship
- Understanding that DC includes everything from citing sources to keeping your information private
- Learning how citizenship applies to self, family and friends, and the larger community

Examples of some "small mistakes" you can use as talking points with your children:

Noticing child included a sentence or paragraph word-for-word in a class paper or presentation – Opportunity to talk about plagiarism and citing sources

#### **Post-Presentation Resources**

Examples of some "small mistakes" you can use as talking points with your children:

- Your child posts a picture of a friend to social media without checking with you first – Opportunity to talk about "digital footprint", privacy and asking permission before posting
- Your child submits their name and address to a contest advertised by a cereal company – Opportunity to talk about SPAM, privacy and asking an adult.
- Your child's friend is upset over an email your child sent "as a joke" –
   Opportunity to talk to them about tone, digital citizenship and offline vs. online.
